Emma is in her 2nd year at the Montessori preschool and attending the full day (her choice). I haven't found that I have much free time, though, because of all the volunteer work for the school. I created a website (http://www.orcasmontessori.org) for the school and took over work on the database of donors that is used for the school fundraisers. Mike helped the school select a new laptop and configured it for them. He gets called to save the day whenever there is a computer problem. I also help with lunch clean up at the school one day a week, which I admit I enjoy because I can see all the kids in action. I've decided I'm ready for Emma to start kindergarten in the public school next year so I can get a break from all the work!

We had several visits from family and friends during the year, which we always enjoy. We also took a week in August to drive to California and visit family and friends, mainly to see Emma's new cousin Allison, courtesy of Mike's sister Cathy and her husband Rich, and to see my Mom who is battling cancer again. She's fighting like a champ despite loosing sight in one eye and regaining it after radiation treatments and then getting pneumonia and having to spend 5 days in the hospital the first of December.

We almost had a white Christmas this year after getting 18 inches of snow the end of November (see picture of Emma). Most of the county lost power for two days because of falling trees. Thank goodness we have a wood burning stove, gas range, and 4-wheel drive vehicles. At least the snow put us in the holiday spirit. We hope you enjoy the spirit of the holidays as well!
